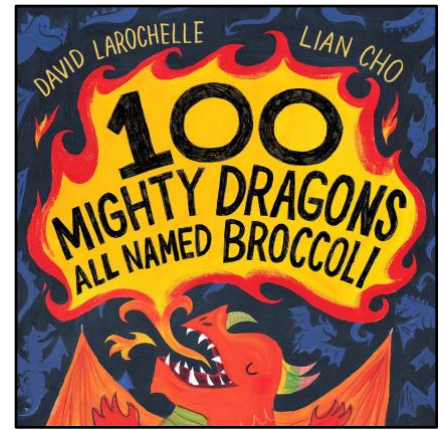


100 Mighty Dragons All Named Broccoli

Book Summary

There are 100 dragons, and they keep leaving and coming back until there is only one left. The last dragon, Broccoli, disappears into a cave for 1 year. When she comes out she is followed by 100 baby dragons. She gives them new and creative names except for Broccoli Jr, this counting adventure can go from a few dragons becoming surfers to a few more being turned into werewolves, poodles and more. This book is an entertaining counting book to read.

Read Aloud Questions

- Where do you think the dragons went? (p. 1)
- Why do you think the wizard changed them? (p. 3)
- What do you think they were cooking? (p. 5)
- How many are wearing sunglasses? (p. 7)
- How many dragons are there? (p. 9)
- How many dragons are left? (p. 11)
- What do you think the dragon did in the cave? (p. 13)
- What do you think the final dragon's name is? (p. 15)
- At what point in the book were there 100 dragons? (p. 18)

Book Activity

Materials:

- oval-shaped paper plate platters
- markers, crayons, paints, or other coloring supplies
- dragon mask templates (see the end of this guide)
- scissors
- glue

Directions

1. After you read aloud the book, *100 Mighty Dragons All Named Broccoli*, ask the students what they might name a baby dragon.
2. Tell the students they are going to create their own baby dragon. Handout a variety of dragon templates and let the students choose the design they would like to use for their dragon.
3. Ask the students to color, paint, and decorate the dragon in the way they would like for it to look.
4. Cut out the dragon mask template, and glue it to a paper plate.
5. Glue the mask onto the platter-shaped paper plate. An adult will need to use an X-Acto knife or sharp scissors to help the students cut the eye holes in the paper plate.
6. Students may add additional decoration or color to the paper plate, if they would like. An elastic strap or tie could be added, as well.
7. Ask the students to wear or hold up their dragon masks as they participate in a counting game. Depending on the age of the students, the teacher may also give math problems for the students to act out. The object of the game would be to act out the adding and subtraction of the dragons and to count the number of dragons left, like in the story.

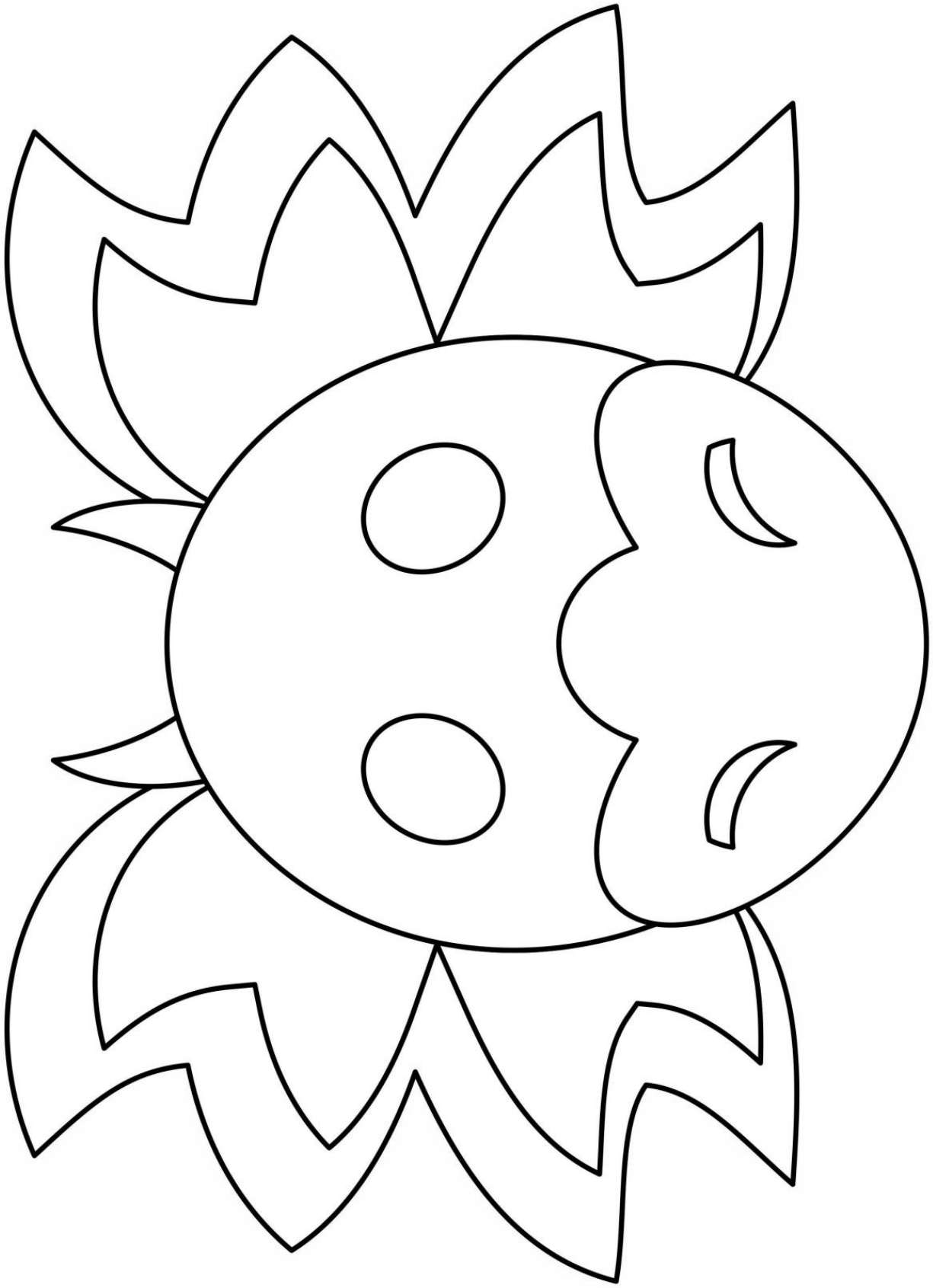
