## AASL Standards for the 21st Century Learner

Standards for the 21st-Century Learner offer vision for teaching and learning to both guide and beckon our profession as education leaders. They will both shape the library program and serve as a tool for library media specialists to use to shape the learning of students in the school. The learning standards begin by defining nine foundational common beliefs:

- Reading is a window to the world.
- Inquiry provides a framework for learning.
- Ethical behavior in the use of information must be taught.
- Technology skills are crucial for future employment needs.
- Equitable access is a key component for education.
- The definition of information literacy has become more complex as resources and technologies have changed.
- The continuing expansion of information demands that all individuals acquire the thinking skills that will enable them to learn on their own.
- Learning has a social context.
- School libraries are essential to the development of learning skills. The Standards describe how learners use skills, resources, and tools to:
  - o inquire, think critically, and gain knowledge;
  - draw conclusions, make informed decisions, apply knowledge to new situations, and create new knowledge;
  - share knowledge and participate ethically and productively as members of our democratic society;
  - pursue personal and aesthetic growth.

To be licensed as a Kansas school library media specialist, an individual must:

- Hold a current, professional (not initial) Kansas teaching license.
- Complete the 29-hour approved graduate-level program listed below.

This is designed for someone with a Master of Library Science and experience as a professional librarian. 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# **School Library Media Practicums**

## **Enrollment Procedure, School Library Media Practicum**

School library media specialist practicum, LI876 (elementary) and LI877 (secondary) are requirements. The school library media practicum requires that students complete 40 clock hours at the elementary level and 40 clock hours at the secondary level. **Prior to enrollment in practicum, the student must**:

- 1. Fill out and submit the <u>School Library Media Practicum Request Form</u> to Beverley Buller at <u>bbuller1@emporia.edu</u> at the <u>beginning of the Spring semester prior to the year in which you would like to take your practicums</u>. These forms must be processed through the ESU Teacher's College office of Field Placement before the student begins the practicum. (These documents provide the State mandated proof that the practicum has been approved in a designated building and with a designated supervisor.) Someone from the Office of Field Placement (620) 341-5447, will contact you when your application has been accepted and your placement has been approved.
- 2. Successfully complete LI851 Managing the School Library Media Center.
- 3. Read the LI876 and LI877 syllabi.
- 4. Once your practicum is approved, arrange a visit to the school library before the practicum begins to discuss the schedule for practicum work and to develop a schedule and outline of practicum activities with your practicum supervisor.

Practicum may be undertaken in the school where the practicum student is employed **provided there is a licensed library media specialist on staff who can fulfill the requirements of a practicum supervisor**. You may be required to complete additional observations in another school library.

## **Requirements for Practicum Supervisor**

You must have a designated supervisor on site for each practicum. The supervisor must be a licensed school librarian with a minimum of two years' experience working in the school library, and hold a Master's degree, preferably the Master of Library Science (other Master's degree in education is acceptable). The practicum supervisor will provide supervision, instruction and guidance. It is important to remember that the practicum should involve participation in current, best practices with a licensed school library media specialist who can teach you more than you otherwise can learn on your own.
